
BISHOP LEETE BACK TO DEDICATE HERE METHODIST CHURCH

Bishop Frederick D. Leete, resident bishop of the Atlanta area of the Methodist Episcopal church, has returned from Florida to dedicate the Ponce de Leon avenue Methodist Episcopal church Sunday. While in Florida, Bishop Leete held three conferences, visited a number of churches, and on last Sunday dedicated the beautiful new church at DeLand, which cost \$40,00. In the absence of Bishop Anderson in Europe, Bishop Leete has supervision of the Cincinnati area.

Bishop William Fraser McDowell, D. D., LL. D., of Washington, D. C., will preach the dedicatory sermon at 11 o'clock. Bishop McDowell is one of the most widely known and popular bishops of the Methodist Episcopal church.

He was ordained to the Methodist ministry in 1882 and served three pastorates in Ohio. In 1890 he was elected chancellor of the University of Denver, serving in this capacity nine years. In 1899 he was elected secretary of the board of education of the Methodist Episcopal church, serving four years. He was elected bishop in 1904.

Bishop McDowell has delivered the Cole lectures at the Vanderbilt university and the Beecher lectures at Yale. He is author of a number of books, among which are "In the School of Christ," "A Man's Religion," and "Good Ministers of Christ."
